

For 2019, the KS2 national curriculum tests will consist of:

- English grammar, punctuation and spelling Paper 1: short answer questions
- English grammar, punctuation and spelling Paper 2: spelling
- English reading : reading booklet and associated answer booklet
- mathematics Paper 1: arithmetic
- mathematics Paper 2: reasoning
- mathematics Paper 3: reasoning

KS2 English grammar, punctuation and spelling test

The grammar, punctuation and spelling test has a focus on knowing and applying grammatical terminology with the full range of punctuation tested.

As in previous years, there are two papers.

Paper 1: grammar and punctuation questions. Pupils will have **45 minutes** to complete the test, answering the questions in the test paper. The questions are worth **50** marks in total.

Paper 2: spelling. This is read out to pupils and they will have approximately 15 minutes to complete the test, but it is not strictly timed.

Children write the 20 missing words in the answer booklet. The questions are worth **20** marks in total.

KS2 English reading test

The test consists of a reading booklet and a separate answer booklet. Pupils will have a total of **1 hour** to read the **3 texts** in the reading booklet and complete the questions at their own pace.

There will be a mixture of genres of text. The least-demanding text will come first with the following texts increasing in level of difficulty.

Pupils can approach the test as they choose: eg working through one text and answering the questions before moving on to the next.

The questions are worth a total of **50 marks**.

KS2 mathematics test

There are **3** papers; Paper 1: arithmetic; Paper 2 & 3: reasoning

Paper 1: Arithmetic. The arithmetic test assesses basic mathematical calculations.

Pupils will have **30 minutes** to complete the test, answering the questions in the test paper. The paper consists of 36 questions with a total of **40** marks available.

The questions will cover straightforward addition and subtraction and more complex calculations with fractions worth **1** mark each, and long divisions and long multiplications worth **2** marks each.

Papers 2 and 3 each consist of a single test paper. Pupils will have **40 minutes** to complete each test, answering the questions in the test paper. Each paper will have questions worth a total of **35** marks.

Test outcomes and results

KS2 national curriculum test outcomes are reported using scaled scores.

For the KS2 tests a scaled score of 100 represents the 'expected standard'. Children achieving between 110 and 120 on the scaled score are usually considered to be at greater depth although this can vary.

A pupil's scaled score is based on their raw score. The pupil's raw score is translated into a scaled score using a [conversion table](#).

Each pupil will receive:

- a raw score (the number of raw marks awarded)

- a scaled score

- and confirmation of whether or not they attained the expected standard

Teacher Assessments

Teacher assessment (TA) is the main focus for end of KS2 English writing. Schools are also required to report TA for science. This is a change from previous years where a TA was also given for English reading and mathematics. From 2019 these are no longer given.

TA provides a judgement that is based on knowledge of how the pupil has performed over time and in a variety of contexts.

For KS2 English writing, the teacher assessment will consist of 3 standards:

- working towards the expected standard
- working at the expected standard
- working at greater depth within the expected standard

For KS2 science, the teacher assessment consists of 1 standard:

- working at the expected standard.
