The key to learning a language is to do a little bit every day, download an app (Duolingo is good and you can compete against friends) play games, read a book/magazine, listen to the radio, watch a film (even if you have the English subtitles on!) or a youtube video, write to a friend abroad or video call friends and family in other countries.

Year 6

There are Powerpoints with audio so you can still hear the words being spoken. There are also workbooks which you can download and complete the activities for each lesson.

After that, you could continue with lessons 33-34.

In preparation for year 7, I would suggest you spend some time revising the basics like numbers, days of the week, colours, animals and greetings. If you can get your hands on a French-English dictionary, it would be a good idea to familiarise yourself with what it looks like and how you might find it useful.

Year 5

We have been studying sport and hobbies, using the verbs jouer (to play) and faire (to do). If you go to the Summer term section and work through Lessons 26-33 (not 28), you'll have chance to practise what we've been learning. There are Powerpoints with audio so you can still hear the words being spoken. There are also workbooks which you can download and complete the activities for each lesson. You could also go back through the lessons in years 3-4 as you won't have seen these before!

In preparation for year 6, I would suggest you spend some time revising the basics like numbers, days of the week, colours, animals and greetings. If you have a French-English dictionary, why not create your own home learning project on a topic you find interesting? Choose some key words and make a vocabulary booklet (remember that nouns are either masculine or feminine!).
